Determining Your Pet's Ideal Weight

It's important for us to determine your pet's ideal weight to recommend appropriate feeding amounts. The Hill's food company has developed tools to help us do this. Charts can help us evaluate body condition to determine how much excess body fat is present. We can also do measurements of specific body landmarks and plug these measurements into a program which calculates an ideal weight. These tools are more accurate than traditional body condition scores that we've used in the past. From there we calculate accurate feeding amounts that will allow for weight loss.

New Metabolic Diet

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Heartworm season is back!

Heartworm Life Cycle

Heartworm is an internal parasite that is transmitted by mosquitoes. An infective mosquito will collect a blood meal from a dog and pass the organism. It will take 6 months for the immature parasite to develop in a dog before it can be detected by a blood test. That's why we test in the spring! If left undetected the parasite will develop and multiply and reside in a dog's pulmonary arteries and heart, and can be fatal.

Heartworm Testing

We collect a small blood sample from your dog and run the test in-clinic. This test detects the heartworm antigen and other tick borne diseases, including Lyme. It's recommended to test dogs 6 months and older (as long as they've been exposed to mosquitoes) two consecutive years and every 2nd year, thereafter. If any heartworm medications are forgotten or your dog is exposed to wood ticks annual testing is recommended.

Heartworm Medication

Heartworm medication kills the immature life stage, 4-5 weeks after exposure. The heartworm larvae that live within the mosquito require consecutive warm days to become infective. We determine our start dates according to the weather in the spring to ensure proper protection. The medication should be given monthly, throughout the summer months and into fall, ending after mosquitos have dissipated.

Heartworm medications also control the most prevalent intestinal parasites found in our region. Roundworms reside in the intestinal tract. Their eggs are passed in feces and are readily transmitted in common areas such as off-leash parks and playgrounds. This parasite can also be transmitted to people. Small children are most vulnerable due to their play and hygienic habits. It's important to wash hands after playing in public playgrounds and sandboxes. This is an attractive area for stray cats to defecate.



Ticks a problem? ...We've Got Your Dog Covered.

In addition to heartworm and roundworm; we also have products available that will control wood ticks. Wood ticks are commonly seen in high grasses and nature paths. If you take your dog camping, to the cottage, off leash parks or walking in grassy or wooded areas; you should consider protecting your dog against wood ticks. They can pass harmful diseases. The most prevalent in our region is Lyme disease. A unique bacterium that is mostly present in deer ticks is transmitted when the tick is attached and feeding. These bacteria then infect the dog or other species. Many dogs will not develop Lyme disease; however some do. They may suffer from fever, lethargy, lameness and kidney problems; and if left untreated in some cases can become very ill and die.

Consider the following products to protect your dog:

- Lyme vaccine: This annual vaccine is highly effective and is the best protection available against Lyme disease.
- Advantix: This product is a monthly topical (applied to the skin) solution. It repels wood ticks and fleas. It can be used in addition to heartworm products and can't come in contact with cats.
- Revolution: This too is a monthly topical solution. It's absorbed into your dog's system. When a wood tick attaches and collects a blood meal, the medication is ingested. The wood tick will die within a 24-48 hour period. This product also protects against heartworm, fleas, roundworm and other intestinal parasites.
