Hot Dog?

With outdoor temperatures rising, keep in mind that pets feel the effects of the heat too. Animals should never be left outdoors for long periods of time during extreme heat or humidity.

Always be sure to provide plenty of shade and drinking water for pets that spend time outdoors. Adding ice cubes to outdoor water dishes can help keep water cool. Shade trees and tarps work well to provide shade without restricting air flow. Providing a wading pool for dogs that enjoy water will allow them an additional place to seek relief from the heat.

Never leave animals in a parked car during summer months. Please remember that the interior temperature of a vehicle can increase drastically in a very short period of time and that leaving a pet in a car while running errands can quickly result in heat stroke or even death.

Safety Kits

Pets can get themselves into all kinds of trouble. Emergency kits are fairly easy to make and can help ensure that you will never be caught off-guard. You may even choose to keep one kit at home and an additional one at the cabin or in the car. The following are some suggested items to include in your pet's emergency kit:

- Scissors
- Tweezers
- Thermometer
- Needle Nose Pliers
- Adhesive Tape
- Roll Gauze
- Tensor Bandage
- Cotton Balls
- Towels
- Blanket
- Iodine
- Hydrogen Peroxide
- Rubbing Alcohol
- Saline
- Imodium
- Kaopectate
- Benadryl
- Polysporin

A Walk in the Park

The rules of dog park etiquette are often posted for owners to read upon entrance to the park. Respecting the park rules is an important part of enjoying your experience with your pet. Here are a few tips to ensure that you and your pet have a joyful time.

Pets that are known to be aggressive towards humans or other dogs should never be taken to an off-leash park. Keep in mind also that any dog can become aggressive in a situation that makes them feel uncomfortable or threatened. Always pay close attention to your dog's body language and remove your dog should you feel he is threatening or being threatened by other park visitors.

Vaccinations are an important tool for keeping your dog protected against life threatening illnesses. Puppies under four months of age will not have all of the vaccinations required to keep them from contracting viruses that could harm them. Although it may be difficult to resist the temptation, it is wise to keep your puppy away from parks until they have completed their vaccination series. Adult dogs that are not up to date with their vaccinations can not only fall victim to disease, but can also pose a health risk to other dogs. For this reason, unvaccinated dogs should not attend areas where other dogs frequent.

Cleaning up after your dog is not only courteous but can also prevent the spread of disease. Many internal parasites and viruses are passed from dog to dog through contact with infected feces. Picking up after your dog will help keep the park clean, prevent the potential spread of parasitic or viral infections and set a good example for other pet owners.

Parks are meant for everyone's enjoyment, being courteous to other pet owners and their furry companions will provide a better experience for all!
